In the beginning there was a man named John. Actually he wasn't the beginning because before him was Charles and before him was his father who hasn't been discovered. Charles had a farm in Albemarle County called Spring Valley and we know he had an orchard and sold some cider to Thomas Jefferson because there's a plaque at Montecello that says so. Never-the-less John was the beginning in Amherst County. He came during the 1770's to be a teacher in the region of Mount Moriah Church. He served in the Revolutionary War as did his father Charles. He later married Susannah Wright and settled on Piney River above the town of Woodson and there had nine children. These children and their descendants spread far and wide but are connected to many in Amherst County and the surrounding Nelson, Campbell and Bedford counties. As far as can yet be determined no tie exists with the Massies of Massie's Mill.

John was a soldier in the Revolutionary War serving as an Ensign. (Amherst County, Virginia In the Revolution Including Extracts from the "LOST ORDER BOOK, 1773-1782 page 36"). His father also served in that war. John's family applied for a war pension but did not receive this because of some documentary difficulty. (Son Thomas and others applied as "Cornet" and DAR records suggest that the John Massey-Cornet was from Albemarle County.) John predeceased his father by 17 years but his widow is mentioned in Charles' will. In the pension application made by Thomas Massie, John is stated to have moved from Albemarle to Amherst during the War, where he married Susanna Wright 1/1/1779. The Court order denying this petition was issued in Nelson County in 1818.

It is beyond the possibility of this brief to do justice to such a vast group of descendants. Many will know of their tie to this family. Some have been mentioned in the written history of the Virginia. Many served in wars and did not return home. I know of several who fought on the side of the South in the War between the States. Two remained in graves at Gettysburg. Samuel Preston Massie, a grandson, returned from that war and entered the Baptist ministry, serving many of the churches in this and Nelson County. He was instrumental in founding several churches and was a noted evangelist. His brother, Paulus Powell Massie also was a Baptist Minister and served several county churches. He and his wife, Emma Woodson Massie, were instrumental in establishing Rose Union Baptist Church in Nelson County. A granddaughter, Josephine, married into the Saunders family that remains prominent in Nelson County. Thomas Massie, a grandson, ran a grist mill at Alhambra on upper Piney River and was a noted metallurgist. He discovered the Martha Cash Tin Mine in the region.

Charles Massie, John's son moved to the Sandiges area of Amherst County and established a lovely home that remains today. His descendants include a State Senator, a noted physician, and among others the present family owning the Massie Insurance Agency.

Inventory and appraisement of the estate of John was filed 4/6/1801 at Amherst County Will Book 4/5.

In support of the application for a Revolutionary War Pension made by Elizabeth Whitehead Wright on behalf of her husband Moses Wright, Susannah Massie called "Mrs Susan Massie, a respectable resident of the County of NELSON --- that she is 81 years old - and recollects distinctly that Moses Wright - - did serve a tour of duty at the barracks near Charlottesville guarding British prisoners

captured at Burgoynes defeat. - - that he served another tour down below Richmond but details had sliped her mind - -." Signed by her mark X

Also declared by above that Benj Camden, Jho Campbell and Jas Ramsey were along with Moses. She recollected that Jimmy Thompsor brother of Billy Thompson was with Moses on one tour of duty in the Rev. War.

In her will presented to the Court of Nelson County by the executor of her estate, Thomas Massie and witnesses, William Wright, and Charles Massie, she directed her tract of land in Amherst County of 100 acres be sold as well as her stock, household and kitchen furniture to be sold, the proceeds distributed as follows: For Nancy Massie, daughter to William Massie for love and for absolute service she rendered in her old age - 1/8th part; For Polly Massie her daughter married to George W. Campbell 1/8th part or to her children equally; For the remainder equally divided between children named: Edmund Massie, Thomas Massie, Jessie Massie, Charles Massie, Elizabeth Massie who married Robert Gill, and John Massie. This will was witnessed by: William Wright, Jessie Wright, Jessie Massie, and signed by Susannah with her mark X.

Notes for EDMUND MASSIE:

Edmund married Nancy Worthum of Georgia whose father was a master carpenter and built several houses in Nelson County. There is a family tradition that Mr. Worthum moved to Georgia and Edmund followed him, married his daughter, Nancy, and they traveled

back to Virginia either by horse or by a one horse wagon bringing their possessions and infant daughter. They are said to have encountered some Indian problems on the way back (perhaps from the Cherokee). They returned to the mountains and lived to be old. The foundation of his son, Charles' house remains above the John Will Campbell Cemetery and is thought to be the approximate site of Edmunds original home. This site is referred to by the Rev. Paulus Powell Massie as "Jefferson's Quarters". Edmund was said to be the overseer of property owned by Lucas Powell, said land formerly owned by Thomas Jefferson. Governor William H. Cabbell granted to Lucas Powell land on the Amherst side of Piney River in 1798 and 1806. After some years Edmund's son, Charles bought this site and Edmund built a house across the river near Shoe Creek in a large level area. His son, Thomas later built a home several hundred yards from this site.

In 1853 Edmund was in Nelson County. The 1860 Census of Nelson shows Edmund, Sr. age 79 with Susan age 50 in the home (probably his daughter Susan b. abt 1810) along with Daniel L. Wright 49, a school teacher.

Interesting is a record showing Edmund's son Thomas Massie as a junior. Could this mean that Edmund was "Thomas Edmund"?, He already has a brother Thomas Jefferson Massie, another Thomas name among siblings? It certainly has occurred in naming multiple children but no substantiation, nor certain spelling of Edmund (o). A copy of John Massie's dictionary, presumably written in John's hand gives Edmund's birthdate and spells clearly the name with "u".

grave. He is said buried in the family cemetery in Amherst County. A family remeber reported seeing stones marked J.M. 11-13-1793 and 4-2-1802. This stone and Pamelia's was seen in 1931.

Notes for JOHN MASSIE:

From his birth in 1807 till his marriage we have but little data. We can only guess that he was a stout, plain bare foot mountain boy. Father and mother would interest us by telling of their marriage and early settlement. Father came into possession of a boundary of land, some 500 acres. On this was a large cleared field on a sunny east slope called "Smith's Race Ground" This name has been handed down from one generation to another as having been a harbor or hideout for fine race horses during the war. This cleared portion of land had been in constant cultivation or it would have grown up like the nearby steep hills. About the middle of this field was a modest log cabin. At the age of 26, the year 1833, he married Sally Moore Hill and came there to make their home till opportunity afforded something better. Sally was cultured and refined, having spent much time with her well-to-do sister of near Lynchburg. She spun and wove her wedding dress. Their kitchen utensils consisted of a skillet and a big oven with pothooks to hang over the fire. Remaining here a short time, he built about a mile lower down, on a pretty level plot of land lying near where a creek empties into the river. Here the second child, Samuel, was born. This house was built of logs from his own forest. He told of how he hunted for solid wood, hickory, to make his doorsills of.

Mother suffered many privations in that lonely forest! There were few settlers close around. Church was seven miles, store and post office ten or twelve miles away. After a few years here, father found a suitable location for a dwelling still lower down the river. Here he had a good four room house built, with a large two room kitchen and a big fireplace over which they did their cooking. This kitchen was a little off from the house, as was the custom those days, and served as a most fitting place for all of the domestic work. They moved to this about 1836 and made this their home through the joys and sorrows of forty-one years. Here all the eleven children were raised to be grown, never had a doctor with one till brother Ed was wounded in the war and sent home - not even at their birth.

The house was snugly built of smoothly hewn logs, the cracks between filled with clay, then whitewashed. The flooring and other planks were sawed with the old type up and down saw. The yard had all types of flowering shrubs, but no grass in the lawns of the mountains, and the bare ground was swept clean and kept so as part of the chores.

We had a great attachment for each other and the strictest reverence for father and mother. His commanding appearance and positive voice was enough. He never gave us a lick in his life. This, with mother's wooing, pleasant manner, obedience was ours.

John Massie was a tall, well built man, not very fleshy. He was very straight and commanding in appearance. His natural gift for poetry and song made him a favorite of children. He was strictly honest and thoughtful and was called familiarly and affectionately, Cousin John and Big John Massie. At the age of seventy, John bought the Harewood Farm and moved there in 1877. Here he spent the remainder of his days. On this farm he set aside a plot of ground for a Massie Cemetery that is presently known and maintained as "Harewood".

"- - if I should be as unfortunate as to fall on the battlefield, I fall honorably in defense of my country and our happy homes in the warm, sunny south. I have no news that I can write with much accuracy in regard to a fight shortly. It is obvious that the enemy is advancing upon us and we may look for a battle any day. - - There is a great deal of sickness in camp at this time. A greater portion of the houses in Centerville is filled up with sick men. It is an awful scenery for so many poor men to be so far from home just laying on the floor and benches with scarcely any person to attend to them. - - "

Apparently both Ed Massie and Ed Ware, his sister Lucy's husband, were wounded at Gettysburg. They both had a leg amputated as a result of wounds. Ed Ware recovered and came home. Ed Massie apparently came home but died as a result of his wounds.

Notes for SAMUEL PRESTON MASSIE:

Emma Woodson Massie, wife of Samuel Preston Massie's brother, Paulus, wrote the following as recollections and as tribute to her brother-in-law.

"Brother Sam at the age of 19 joined Piney River Baptist church, the old meeting house of Grandfather's day. In 1861 he enlisted in the Civil War, said to have been a brave soldier till the surrender at Appomattox April 1865. He was then 29. (Speaking as Paulus) We held many protracted meetings together. We talked much of past days and some about the war, and that new beginning every soldier had to make. " I couldn't express the joy of getting home and the war over. The quiet hills were such a relief to me after four years of guns and battle cries. Yet this joy was mingled with sorrow. I missed my two brothers that were less fortunate than myself. They were claimed by the battles. Though the love of home and to be with my home people was so strong, there was a yearning in my heart for a wider field of usefulness. But how and where to begin - no money and such a limited education. Though humiliated and discouraged I had faith in a higher power to direct and guide me, though my future didn't look very bright. I could only do with my might what my hands found to do. I learned tobacco was high. I went in to father's big forest, felled the trees for a big new ground which was favorable to tobacco. I planted a crop which brough tme \$500.

Being more encouraged I made my plans to go to Richmond College. This I did; spent three sessions there as a ministerial student. I spent my vacations at home bringing one of my college friend with me, Bolus Cade. I worked in the crops some but Cade and I would go out and hold meetings, walking some 10 or 12 miles away in the mountain sections where the gospel was seldom preached. Our ambition was to preach the gospel to the poor, to soothe and comfort the fallen and discouraged from the war. After three years of college, I came back to fathers still finding a warm welcome at home. I followed up one of our meetings on or very near the top of the Blue Ridge,(the Skyline Drive now passing within several hundred yards of the meeting place) which was an old tobacco barn. After a week's preaching there were many conversions. At the close of the meeting we organized a Baptist Church, still holding church service there in the old barn till they could build a church.

On my 34th birthday, 1870, Miss Lucy Cox and I were married. After a short time she and I went up to spend a while near this little church. We became interested and remained two years. (This was quite a hardship for Lou, as she was reared in a large family near a town and there with nothing to use up her industrious spirit. She often told me (speaking as Emma) later of the favorite stump she used to rest on in the sunshine and to cry all she wanted to. Leaving her tears there, she would meet Sam with a cheerful look - - -.) After some years I bought a farm at Lowesville on the Amherst side.

Most of Sam's pastorates were in Amherst and Nelson counties. He was in demand as a revival speaker and some 6000 professions made through his ministry. He was said to have travelled some 40,000 miles on horseback in his ministry.

He served throughout the Civil War in Company I, 19th Virginia Infantry, Pickett's Division.

"Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst our esteemed friend and companion in arms, private John W. Massie, who died from the effects of wounds received at the battle of Gettysburg, July 3, 1863.

Therefore be it first resolved that in the death of that lamented hero, we all feel individually and collectively, have been made the victims of sore bereavement of the loss of a friend so true and patriotic and so brave.

Second, that by the death of private John W. Massie, our country has sustained a loss rare in the long catalogue of death; and his community has received a shock which will dampen the feelings of all and enshroud their sympathies with the deepest solemnity.

Third, that he was cool and brave in the midst of strife and carnage, so was he beloved and honored by all his companions-in-arms and as he was gentle, kind, and courteous, among his friends at home his death to them is but the deeper affection.

Fourth, that although he died in a foreign prison without a friend to shed a tear of affection over his grave, yet by his ardent zeal for his countries cause and his untiring efforts to alleviate the hardships of his companions, he has left behind him a name that never will be erased from our memories.

Fifth, that we deeply sympathize with his relatives and friends at home, and may they be comforted with the thought, as well as we, that he has finished his career in life upon the alter of his country and that he has gone to a better land."

Excerpts from letters home:

Camp near Fredricksburg December - "I have no news to write at this time without writing about hard times and that is not worth writing. We fare very badly in the way of something to eat. Our ration is mighty short but we have plenty blankets - - -.Some thinks there will be a hard fight here in a few days. As for my part I don't know anything about it but I hope they won't fight any more, for I am tired of fighting and I don't see any chance for peace. I think if war was to end today we would pay dear for independence.- - I must close but I remain your affectionate brother until death. John Massie

Notes for BETTIE ANNE MASSIE:

Bettie, known as "Granny Bet", was a midwife and taught her daughter Mag her skills. When her father John bought the property owned by a doctor Harr (Harewood cemetery) Thad and Bet moved down from the "race grounds" to John's home place. There Mag and Walter's firstborn, Bunyan was delivered by his grandmother. When he was born, Bettie's first grandchild, she took him upstairs to show the family gathered how clear blue his eyes were. It is probable that Walter Miles, and Lillian were also born there. At that time daughter Mag was living near the mouth of Shoe Creek. After buying the "Blue Gravel" property, Bettie and Thad first lived in a log home. After Thad's death Bettie had a home constructed that stands today (1998), although unused, a solid structure. She is said to have been a great entertainer, was always witty, cheerful and full of energy. She is said to have shot a crane with a shot gun when she was 70 years old. Bettie was big and heavy, her husband Thad was tall and "raw boned".

Notes for THADDEUS C. COX:

Thadeus married his first cousin who he probably knew by visiting "Big John" Massie's mountain home. He was raised in the Monroe, Virginia area. He and Bettie were married at her mountain home by her brother Samuel Preston, the ceremony performed in the morning, she, dressed in purple, was called by her father "Morning Bride", looking like a morning glory. They lived first at the "race grounds" about a mile up the North Fork of Piney River. There Mag, their first child, was born and there probably also Cora, Nettie and Sal came into the world. Edna Wright, Nettie's daughter remembers visiting them at the "race grounds" and that he raised corn, wheat. tobacco and hogs and cattle there. After John bought the Harr property and moved, Thad and family bought and lived in John's old place about a mile down the river. There several of the grandchildren were born. Later (1889) they moved to "Blue Gravel", the property adjoining John's, he having left his mountain home earlier. This property may have been so named for the occurrence of bits of amethyst that could be found there and on John's land. There also was a mineral in demand that occurred there used in the processing of iron, "rutile ?' that may have been the source of the name. Several family members have rings made from amethyst found there. Thad died from a cancer that arose on his arm and spread to his arm pit, there rupturing an artery. He is said to have died singing "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone". Thad and Bettie were staunch church members and when meetings were held at Piney River Baptist Church, would hook up a wagon and bring members down the river to church, often times a wagon load full. He was widely known as "Cousin Thaddie".

His father was a pioneer in the settlement of this county, and the subject of this sketch is the discoverer of the well known "Martha Cash Tin Mine", which yields the greatest percent of any in the United States. In Louisa county, Virginia, December 22, 1852, Thomas Massie and Susan P. Poindexter were united in marriage, and they have seven children -----. Susan P., wife of Mr. Massie, was born in Louisa county, May 1, 1832, a daughter of Richard and Lucy (Nelson) Poindexter. Her father is deceased, and her mother is now living in Amherst county. Mr Massie was two years constable in Nelson county, and carried on a fine farm."

Thomas, possibly Thomas Edmund, was said to always carry a rock hammer everywhere he went "always peckin' on rocks".

Thomas and Susan built a large log house a few hundred yards from Edmund's home near the future site of the Mountain Mission School (Alhambra). He built and operated a grist (corn) mill near his home. Paulus Powell Massie, through his wife's pen, stated that Tom was offered \$75,000. for his interest in the tin mine. For some reason, he never realized financially much from this mine. "Uncle Tommie" lived to be very old, as did his eldest son Cyrus, who lived nearly to 100 years.

Thomas was found in the home of his son, Walker in the 1910 Census, a 92 year old man then, blind in his old age.

On May 4, 1947, Rev. John H. Massie resigned his pastorate of the Humston Baptist Church at Edinburg, Va., and the Lost City Baptist Church at Lost City, W. Va., after fortyfour years of continuous service. These churches are located on opposite sides of the mountain, twenty-odd miles from each other. In order to carry on the work Brother Massie, as long as he was able, rode horseback across this mountain. Since then one of his sons has taken him back and forth in an automobile, having to drive for each service approximately 120 miles -- as the road over the mountain is often in such condition that a car cannot pass over it. In addition to serving these two churches Brother Massie has supplied other churches in the Valley, serving one of them, Hebron located at Gore, for as many as twelve years.

Brother Massie was sent to the Valley in June, 1903, By the State Mission Board to get the Baptist work started in Shenandoah County. It was not long until he had the Humston Church organized and a building erected and paid for. In 1904 he was called to the Lost City Church. In a few years the work had gotten under way to such an extent that he felt it could and should be self-sustaining. Since then the denomination has not assisted in any financial way.

Mr. Massie was born at Lowesville, Va., September 9, 1863. In June, 1868, he began his schooling in a log cabin with a dirt floor and slab benches. From then until 1880 he attended the public school for three months each year, November to March, spending the remainder of the year working on his father's farm. In 1884 he attended a private school in Amherst, Va. The next two years he taught in the public schools of Virginia. In 1887 he attended Dranne Academy at Granville, Ohio. In the fall of 1889 he entered Denison University where he received his A. B. degree in 1893. That fall he accepted the student pastorate of the Baptist church at Maxahala, Ohio, and continued his studies at Denison where he won his Master's Degree the following June. From here he went to Crozer Theological Seminary at Chester, Pa., where he remained for one year. The following six years were spent as principal of the Lowesville, Va., private school and as supply pastor for several churches in Nelson and Amherst counties. It was from this work that he moved at the request of the State Mission Board to the Valley of Virginia to begin Baptist work in Shenandoah County.

On September 12, 1893, Mr Massie married Miss Cora Massie Cox, of Nelson County. To this union were born five sons and one daughter. Two of the sons have remained near home and active in the Humston Church. Another is active in the First Baptist Church of Richmond while still another is taking his place as a leader in the First Baptist Church of Winchester. The daughter has been for years active in the First Baptist Church of Newport News.

Those who have been privileged to know Brother Massie best have found him to be a true scholar and a real gentleman. By nature he is gentle, kind and loving. Through the years he has walked humbly before his God an wrought well in the work of the Master. --- A report from the Religious Herald

Fletcher was a tall man, above six feet in height, was a Lieutenant in the Civil War and was mentioned in the writing " Retreat from Petersburg to Appomattox".

He served in the Civil War with the Nelson Artillery, Lamkin's Battery. He was wounded several times: first in the arm and head at Pocotaligo, South Carolina and the second and the worst being a serious scalp wound at the Battle of Petersburg in July 1864. He was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant for his service. He was present at the surrender at Appomattox Court House and according to "The Nelson Artillery: Lamkin and Rives Batteries" by W. Cullen Sherwood, he was allowed to keep one horse after the surrender. When the war ended, he returned to Nelson County and married Mary "Mollie" Beard. He was a teacher, carpenter, and farmer.

"I, Edgar F. Massie, Sr. was born on my grandfather, Robert Massie's farm. In one of the small houses there I first saw the light of day on January 31, 1882. Jesse Massie, my great grandfather died there April 2, 1882. My mother, Bettie Loving (kidd) Massie often told me about this. They had been sitting up with him several nights. He had been sick. At the breakfast table this particular morning, they heard a noise in his room. Someone went in to see what he wanted. They found him sitting on the side of the bed and when asked what he wanted, he replied, "I want to go to meeting if there is any." They got him settled back in bed and someone remained with him the rest of the time. He died that day and was buried in the family graveyard near Piney River Church, on the land that was owned by his father, John Massie and Susanna Wright Massie. My father Joseph Thomas Massie carved Jesse Massie's initials and dates of birth and death on a stone (J.M. 9-22-1796 & 4-2-1882). After the grave was filled this stone was placed at the head of the grave.

When I visited the graveyard in 1931 I found the above stone mentioned, and another on a grave by it marked (P.M. 9-22-1796 & 7-4-1867). This was the grave of Pamelia (Campbell), wife of Jesse. We visited the graveyard up the river above this and found a grave with a stone on it marked the same way (initials "J.M.) This was the grave of Jesse Massie #2, the first husband of Caroline E. Davidson Massie.

My grandfather Robert Massie was a very tall, dark haired man; kind hearted and well thought of. My mother said she never heard him say an unkind thing about anyone. - - -"

There is a story that Thomas Jefferson died in Charlottesville with a fever and his body was packed in charcoal and returned home for burial. Bettie didn't want to be put by him in burial because she couldn't be sure he was her husband. She is said buried at the Byron Massie cemetery.
